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DID YOU KNOW...

Over 31,000 people are estimated to be living with HIV in the province of Ontario.

We now know more about HIV than we ever have. We know that if you are diagnosed, connected to care, and start HIV treatment early you can have a long, healthy, full life. We also know that HIV treatment and maintaining an undetectable viral load (amount of HIV in bodily fluid usually measured in blood) is not only great for your health but also makes it unlikely that the virus can be passed on. We also have more tools than ever before to prevent the transmission of HIV.

In Ontario, there is a system of prevention, testing, care and support. There are many programs and resources to respond to HIV in the province. HelloOntario.info is a website that is here to help you get connected. It is important to know where you can find the information and help you need. If you or someone you know is living with HIV/AIDS, this resource is here to provide you with basic information about HIV and AIDS, and to point you in the right direction for treatment, support and care services.

KNOW THE FACTS

There are three ways HIV can be passed (transmitted) from one person to another:

Sexual Transmission The most common way is through "condomless" vaginal / internal genital or anal sex.


Blood Transmission

Shared needles or other drug use equipment

Vertical Transmission Formerly referred to as "mother-to-child transmission". HIV can be transmitted during pregnancy, labour and delivery, or through breastfeeding



There are only six fluids in the body that contain enough HIV to infect someone. These are:





You can have HIV and not know it. The only way to know for sure is by getting tested. Your test results are yours and are not necessarily reflective of your partner(s) HIV status. WILL MY HIV STATUS AFFECT MY APPLICATION TO LIVE IN CANADA?

People living with HIV/AIDS have the same rights as all other people in Canada. Do not assume that your HIV status will prevent you from being granted the status you seek in Canada. Refugees and all people applying to live in Canada must complete an Immigration Medical Exam (IME) that includes an HIV test. Sharing your HIV status with your lawyer may make your refugee claim stronger. If you are comfortable with sharing, tell a lawyer about your HIV status as soon as you can. Lawyers are required by law to keep everything you say confidential.

Settlement services help newcomers settle and adjust to their new life in Ontario, offering services such as:

LEGAL SERVICES

The HIV & AIDS Legal Clinic Ontario (HALCO) is a charitable not-for-profit community-based legal clinic that provides free legal services for people living with HIV/AIDS who live in Ontario.





HEALTH CARE

In Ontario, there is high quality HIV medical care available. If you are new to Ontario, you can access health care through your private insurance, the Ontario Health Insurance Program (OHIP), the Interim Federal Health Program (IFHP), or the Ontario Temporary depending on immigration status (e.g., immigrant, refugee, student, permanent resident, or visitor). If you are not entitled to public health care coverage, you may be able to access health care by going to a community health centre free of charge. IMPORTANT

If you need urgent medical care, you can go to a hospital emergency room. Hospitals are required to admit you, if your life is in danger. If you do not have an Ontario Health Insurance Program (OHIP) card, you will get a bill for the services provided by the hospital. If you cannot pay the bill, speak with your worker at your local AIDS service organization (ASO) or a lawyer. Do not let the prospect of a bill prevent you from going to a hospital emergency room if you are in need of urgent medical care.



ACCESSING MEDICATION FOR PEOPLE LIVING WITH HIV

For better health outcomes, getting into treatment early is recommended. People with HIV live longer, healthier lives.

HIV medication today is much easier to take and has fewer side-effects.

HIV medication is not free in Ontario. Finding a program to pay for HIV medication can take some time. As a person who is new to Ontario, you may not yet qualify for health care services and insurance. If you do not have an insurance plan to cover the cost of HIV medication, you can apply for government financial support programs that can help you pay for medication. Get help from your local community health centre, settlement agency, or AIDS service organization (ASO) to find out what financial support program you are eligible to apply to. A support worker at one of these organizations can help you fill out the paperwork and apply.



FINDING THE RIGHT DOCTOR

In Ontario, there is very high quality HIV medical care available. But, not just any doctor or nurse practitioner can provide the high quality care you need and have a right to. To find high quality HIV care contact your local AIDS service organization (ASO) or community health centre. You can also contact Health Care Connect.

In some cases, the care is provided by a person who specializes in treating infections like HIV. To access their services you need a referral from a family doctor.



IMPORTANT

In Ontario, health care is confidential under the Personal Health Information Act. Doctors are required by law to maintain patient confidentiality. Do not be afraid to ask your provider questions about their privacy and confidentiality policies.

HIV PROGRAMS & SERVICES

There are a number of social programs and services available for people living with HIV/AIDS in Ontario. Many of these programs and services are provided through AIDS service organizations (ASOs) and other community organizations. Services and resources include:



Counseling and support (for mental health and emotional wellness)



Financial advice and employment



Food and day-to-day living



Harm reduction (for people who use injection drugs and other substances - provision of safer drug use supplies)



Sexual health (counseling, free condoms and lubricant, referrals)



Housing referrals



Legal support and referrals



HIV and sexually transmited infection (STI) testing



IMPORTANT

HIV services in Ontario are confidential. What you discuss with your counsellor is between you and them. Ask about the agency's privacy and confidentiality policies when making an appointment.

Through the AIDS and Sexual Health InfoLine, you can access trained counsellors you can talk to about sexual health, including HIV/AIDS, sexually transmitted infections (STIs), sexuality, sexual orientation, relationship concerns, etc. You can even get referrals to appropriate clinics and community agencies [e.g., AIDS service organization (ASO)] and HIV programs, or information about where to get tested for HIV across Ontario. This service is free and anonymous.
